Having a Safe Vacation

Summer is the perfect time for a family break, but criminals don't take a summer break. You can avoid becoming a victim to lurking property predators by staying alert and following a few basic prevention measures.

- Be aware of what's happening in your neighborhood. Make sure you talk to your neighbors and participate in neighborhood block clubs or block watch groups to stay informed.
- Lock your doors, including the garage door. Unlocked doors are open invitations to intruders.
- Ask a trusted family member, friend or neighbor to keep a watchful eye on your home or have your mail held at the local post office until you return.
- Put lights on timers to give the impression that someone is home.
- Don't post on social media that you are leaving town, and wait to post photos until after you return from your trip.

Safety is everyone's business. Practice good safety measures. Stay alert; if you see something, say something.
