

#### The Cleveland Police Foundation is honored to recognize Patrol Officer Tony Harper as the January 2021 Police Officer of the Month.

For over 24 years, **Patrol Officer Tony Harper** has been with the Cleveland Division of Police and has served in the Community Policing Unit. During that time, PO Harper was involved in many community and child-related programs. They include D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education), G.R.E.A.T. (Gang Resistance Education and Training), R.A.D.

Officer Harper has been a big part of the Cleveland P.A.L. program for over 18 years, volunteering hundreds of hours of his own time in addition to his regular work hours. Much to the enjoyment of the youngsters, the officer could also be found playing music as a professional DJ, appearing around town throughout the year and at Camp George Forbes in Highland Hills (a recreational activity site run by the City of Cleveland).

When asked about Officer Harper's involvement in the P.A.L. program, Executive Director Bob Kumazec stated "Tony epitomizes what it means to be a police officer dedicated to his community. He has helped countless families and youngsters during his career in many different ways and in many different roles."

As a young adult in 1974, **Jim Craciun** was asked by a Catholic priest to help smuggle Bibles and catechism books into Communist-ruled Romania. Jim agreed and successfully completed the mission. That experience not only solidified his lifetime advocacy for religious freedom but also his love for his fellow man.

At the present time, Jim serves proudly as the Vice President of the Cleveland Police Foundation and is a true supporter of the men and women of the Cleveland Division of Police. Before the COVID-19 pandemic took over our way of life, Jim could always be found at CPF events.

When the CPD lost two of its Heroes in Blue in September 2020, Jim found out that Officer Nick Sabo's family was having financial issues. Through his **Craciun-Berry Funeral home**, all arrangements for the funeral service of PO Sabo were handled at no cost to the family. Jim also made it his personal mission to ensure a flag was placed on the officer's casket and eventually presented to the officer's wife.

It is because of his compassion and devotion to his community and his fellow man that the Cleveland Police Foundation is honored to name Jim Craciun as its **Community Partner of the Month for January 2021.**


### We're Going to Miss Him

## **Safety and Crime Prevention Tips**

The Cleveland Police Foundation in partnership with the Cleveland Division of Police and the Ohio Crime Prevention Association presents these tips so residents can help to make our community safer.

#### HOW DO I TALK TO MY CHILD ABOUT GUNS?

While there is no specific age to talk to a child about gun safety, a good time to introduce the subject is when he or she shows an interest in firearms. This interest can come from family members, friends, toy guns, video games, or television shows or movies. Talking openly and honestly about gun safety with your child is usually more effective than just ordering him or her to "Stay out of the gun closet" and

leaving it at that. Such a statement may just stimulate a child's natural curiosity to investigate further.

#### WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO DISCUSS PRETEND VS. REAL LIFE WITH MY CHILD?

Children often see characters shot and "killed" with well-documented frequency on TV and in the movies. When that child sees the same actor appear in next week's episode, or another movie or TV show, confusion between entertainment and real-life may result. In many video games, players actively shoot other characters with no personal consequences. The player can simply hit the reset button to bring themselves and other characters back to life.

Do not assume that your child knows the difference between being "killed" on TV or in a video game and the reality of gun violence. Having toy guns in the house is a decision each parent should make. If your child has toy guns, you may want to use them to explain how they differ from genuine firearms. Make sure you tell them to never assume a gun they see or find is a toy.

Safety is everyone's business. Practice good safety measures. Stay alert; if you see something, say something.
