The 147th Cleveland Police Academy Graduates!

Friday, July 30, 2021, at 11 a.m. on Mall C Mayor Frank G. Jackson administered the oath of office to 34 graduates of the 147th Cleveland Police Academy. This was the first Cleveland Police Academy graduation to be held outdoors. It was live-streamed on the City of Cleveland's Facebook page.

The officers were selected following a Civil Service examination for the position of patrol officer. Candidates underwent several tests and a comprehensive background check before being offered conditional employment. As recruits they received over 1,100 hours of instruction in police tactics, criminal law, community diversity, bias-free policing and crisis intervention training. In addition, they received training specifically to prepare them to respond to the needs of the Cleveland community.

The newly sworn officers will be assigned to one of the five Neighborhood Police Districts across the city.

Safety and Crime Prevention Tips

The Cleveland Police Foundation in partnership with the Cleveland Division of Police and the Ohio Crime Prevention Association presents these tips so residents can help to make our community safer.

Domestic Violence

No one deserves to be abused. Hopefully if you are being abused, you will be able to find a way to safely get out of the abusive relationship. However, the reality is that for many different reasons, some victims are not able to leave an abusive relationship once the abuse begins. If you're in a physically abusive relationship, please consider the following tips to help try to keep you and your children safe until the time comes when you are able to leave.

During the Violence

- The abuser may have patterns to his/her abuse. Try to be aware of any signs that show she/he is about to become violent so that you can assess how dangerous the situation may be for you and your children.
- If it looks like violence may happen, try to remove yourself and your children from the situation before the violence begins.
- Be aware of anything the abuser can use as a weapon. Keep any sharp or heavy objects that she/he may use to hurt you out of reach.
- Figure out where the "safer places" are in your home the places where there aren't weapons within arm's reach. If it looks like the abuser is about to hurt you, try to get to a safer place.
- If the abuser does start to harm you, don't run to where the children are; the abuser may hurt them too.
- If there's no way to escape the violence at that moment, make yourself a small target. Dive into a corner and curl up into a ball. Protect your face and put your arms around each side of your head, wrapping your fingers together.
- Try not to wear scarves or long jewelry. The abuser could use these things to strangle you.
