Officer Rodriguez was one of five Cleveland SWAT officers seriously hurt on June 5, 2020 during a crash while responding to a call on the near-east side. Jonathan sustained a paralyzing injury of his spinal cord. His rehabilitation therapy is continuing. PO Rodriguez, 31, was on the force for seven years. He was joined at his recent retire party by his wife Patrol

Since 1989, Hispanic UMADAOP has existed to empower the Hispanic/Latino community in Cleveland to reduce the




negative impacts of abuse of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs through culturally sensitive, holistic prevention, education, intervention, and treatment programs.

The highlight of our night was when we received an assignment for Domestic Violence, and how different generations of training and experience come to play on the assignment. Anthony handled the call as he was taught, thoroughly questioning both parties, gathering the facts. While talking to the 53-year-old male complainant, he felt comforted by my words and actions. He looked at Anthony and said, 'You should be more like your partner.' I chuckled to myself as he didn't know we were father and son."



Max further stated: "Working the zone car together is a memory that will last a lifetime for me. I got to spend time with my son, see him in action, share in a comradery that few understand. I want to thank all the bosses that made it happen! It truly is a highlight of my career in Law Enforcement!"

Anthony posted: "It's not every day that as a law enforcement officer you get a chance to work with your dad. Grateful for all the people who helped it to happen and glad I got to drag my dad over to a night shift a couple nights ago."

# **Safety and Crime Prevention Tips**

# **Halloween Safety Tips**

#### WALK SAFELY

- Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks.
- Look left, right and left again when crossing the street and keep looking as you cross.
- Put electronic devices down and keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.
- Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.
- Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, face traffic as far to the left as possible.
- Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

#### KEEP COSTUMES BOTH CREATIVE AND SAFE

- Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.
- Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks.
- Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.
- When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

#### DRIVE EXTRA SAFELY ON HALLOWEEN

- Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods.
- Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
- Eliminate any distractions in your car so you can concentrate on the road and surroundings.
- Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn on your headlights.

• Popular trick-or-treating hours are 5:30 – 9:30 p.m., so be extra alert during those hours.

Safety is everyone's business. Practice good safety measures. Stay alert; if you see something, say something.
