


The Foundation's New Board Chair, Dick Clough

It is an honor and privilege to lead the Cleveland Police Foundation in the capacity of Board Chair and President. My term will be the culmination of nine years of service to the Board, and over 40 years of experience launching, leading, marketing, and advising business, political, community and social service organizations. I have some big shoes to fill building on the foundation of my predecessor Grant Dinner.



During these challenging times for the guardians we support and the community they serve, both the police and citizens/businesses really need us to step up. And I fervently believe we have barely scratched the surface of the Foundation's potential.

Striding forward, however, we have more work to complete to get our house in order. Previously as Governance Committee Chair my focus was recruiting a larger, more effective Board. This activity will continue as the first of five goals during the first year of my term in office. We have a good group, but we need to learn how to work together as a team. My role as Chair is to provide the leadership and motivation to make it so.

Other first year goals include:

- Implement Policies and Practices. The Foundation has a ways to go before we can demonstrate to funders and the community that we have the structure, systems, and discipline in place to be trusted recipients of funding and managers of successful programming.
- Tweak Portfolio of Programs. We are currently experiencing an issue other
 non-profits have dealt with...mission creep aka the inability to say no. We
 don't have the resources to do everything we are asked nor would like, and
 thus we need a system of metrics and a process to evaluate existing
 programs and proposed initiatives. We'll learn how to tweak, expand or
 delete underperforming programs, carefully consider other organizations
 to take over projects so the Foundation can pursue new initiatives. We'll be
 exploring partnerships and collaborations to achieve "more bang for the
 buck" and expand our reach.
- Facilitate Fundraising. The lifeblood of the Foundation is money and we need
 to continually develop new sources of funding. I will continue to be heavily
 engaged with our sponsorship and business membership initiatives, and
 pitching heavy-hitters. And the engagement with the immediate task of
 achieving the lofty goal of our Vision '21 Campaign by Memorial Day.
- Leadership Succession Planning. Finally, I will be investing time to identify my successor and working to groom her or him for the rigors of the position. Elected leadership will not be a popularity contest but a process of succession.

Needless to say I have my work cut out for me to achieve all that has been described. I'll circle back from time to time to provide a progress report in this space. And your questions, comments, and ideas are welcome via my email at cloughcleveland@gmail.com.

Ripepi Family Grant = 5 New K9's!

March 14, the Ripepi Family announced the recipients of SRT K9

Unit - Police K9 Grants. The following Police Departments will each receive a Police K9 Officer (dog), complete six-week training course at Excel K-9 Services located in Hiram, Ohio, K9 equipment, and a tactical K9 vest: Brunswick Police Department, Cleveland Division of Police, Euclid Police Department, MetroHeath Medical Center Police Department, and Parma Heights Police Department.



The goal was to purchase four K-9 Units. With the success of the first concert, SRT K9 Unit and the A. Ripepi & Sons Funeral Homes, Inc. were able to purchase *five* police dogs for the Greater Cleveland area.

The grant was made possible by funds raised during The Danny Ripepi Memorial Concert, a charity event which took place last September at Jacobs Pavilion at Nautica on the West Bank of the Flats, and featured multi-platinum recording artist Night Ranger, Cleveland's own Beau Coup and High Voltage, the nation's premier AC/DC tribute band.

Planning for the 2nd Annual Danny Ripepi Memorial Concert is currently in the works for late fall of 2022. Details regarding this year's charity recipient and concert will be announced soon.

While Danny was heading to work on September 24, 2020, he was tragically killed in a freak accident when a dump truck caused a highway sign to crash onto his vehicle. Sadly, he died at the scene on I-480. He is survived by his wife, three children and three stepchildren.

In true Danny fashion, the memorial concerts are not to serve as a family fundraiser, but as an opportunity to give back to the community he loved so much. Danny believed in three things: family, faith and friendship. His gentle demeanor, kind heart and his love as a devoted husband, dad, brother and friend to many, is the legacy he leaves behind. Now is our time to continue his legacy in the most poignant way, by giving back.


Congratulations New First District Officers!

How to Develop the Situational Awareness of Jason Bourne!

That superhuman ability to observe his surroundings and make detailed assessments about his environment? It's not just a trait of top secret operatives; it's a skill known as situational awareness, and you can possess it too.

As the names implies, situational awareness is simply knowing what's going on around you. It sounds easy in principle, but in reality requires much practice. And while it is taught to soldiers, law enforcement officers, and yes, government-trained assassins, it's an important skill for civilians to learn as well. In a dangerous situation, being aware of a threat even seconds before everyone else can keep you and your loved ones safe.


